Decoding	To apply my knowledge of root words, prefixes and suffixes to read aloud and understand the meaning of new words.	
Fluency	To read aloud and perform, showing an understanding of intonation, tone volume and action. To read aloud with expression and intonation, considering punctuation, fluency and accuracy. To understand and identify when reading does not make sense and self-correct.	
Retrieval	To scan different texts to find evidence to support answers to questions. To speed read or skim the text to understand the gist or main idea.	
Inference	To identify a range of evidence to make predictions about characters. To infer and explain how a character's thoughts, feelings or motives have changed over the course of a text.	
Reader Response	To refer to the text and use evidence to justify opinions and summarise responses.	
Author Intent	To explain the author's techniques for describing characters, settings and actions.	
Vocabulary	To discuss how authors use figurative language and the impact this has on the reader.	
Poetry	To show an awareness of audience when reading out loud using intonation, tone, volume and action.	
Non-Fiction	To distinguish between fact and opinion. To apply my knowledge of texts and organisational devices to retrieve, record and discuss information from non-fiction texts.
